



# **Visual Social Story**

Live Performances

This Visual Story is provided to support children and adults with additional needs and disabilities to help prepare them in their visit to the theatre and help them to familiarize themselves with the surroundings.

When I get to the theatre there may be lots of people waiting to get in.

If I don't have my tickets, I will need to collect them from the box office.

I might have to wait in a queue, but it will not take long.



For my safety the box office has a plastic screen up to protect me and the staff.

If I find it Difficult to wear a Mask or face covering, I do not have to.




There may be hand gel around the theatre so I can clean my hands as I go around the building.



While I wait for the main auditorium to open, I may want to have a drink or a snack from the bar if it is open, or Puds 'n' Guds.



At the Bar there is a one-way system. I can follow the signs on the floor to show me where to go.



My Ticket will show me where to sit in the Main Auditorium.

There will be a Letter for the Row and Number for the seat.

There will be a Door Number to show me the easiest way to my seat.

**Door 1** and **Door 2** are next to the bar.

**Door 3** and **Door 4** are up the stairs on the Balcony Level (There is also a lift).



When the Main Doors open there will be a steward waiting to check my ticket and help me find my seat.



The Main Auditorium is Very Big and there may be people sitting next me throughout the show, this is Okay.

Whilst we wait for the Show to begin it may get loud in the Auditorium.



When it is time for the show to start, there will be an announcement on the loudspeaker to say the show is about to begin.

The theatre will then get darker, and everyone will get quieter.

If I listen to the actors on the stage, I will be able to hear more of the story.

During the Show it may get very loud. If it is too loud, I can use my ear defenders if I have brought them, or I can cover my ears with my hands.



There may be flashing or bright lights During the show. If it gets too much, I can use my hands to cover my eyes.



I can leave the auditorium at any time if I need a break and come back in when I am ready.

Halfway through most shows there will be a break, this is called an interval.

During the interval the lights will get brighter, and people may leave the auditorium to get

a drink, an ice cream or they can go to the toilet.







Someone may ask me if I am enjoying the show, and what I think of the show.

There will be an announcement over the loudspeaker, to tell me how long is left in the interval, and when to go back to my seat in the auditorium.

The Interval is Minutes

The lights will get darker for the start of act 2 to begin.

When the story is finished, all the actors or performers will come out on stage.

This is called a curtain call.




The audience will clap a lot, so the actors know how much everyone liked the show. Some people will cheer and make loud noises to show they had a really good time.

If it is too noisy, I can cover my ears, or ask the person that came with me, to take me out of the auditorium.

### **Areas of the Theatre**





If I need the toilet I can go upstairs or downstairs or use the lift.

There is a disabled toilet on all floors and a baby changing toilet on the Bar Level.

To access the Baby changing and Disabled toilet on the bar level, I need to ask the staff at box office or a steward to let me in.

## **Bar and Stall Level**








## **Balcony Level**









### **Helpful Tips**

- Free Car Park available at the rear of the Theatre, with disabled spaces at the rear and near the front of the building.
- Arrive early to have a look around and collect your tickets, go to the toilet and have time to settle into the theatre
  - Booster Seats Available
  - Toilets available on all levels of the theatre, including disabled toilets on all levels (please ask box office for fob if you require baby changing facilities)

#### **Relaxed Performances ONLY:**

- While you wait for the show to begin, if it gets too busy, the Relaxed Room
   (Breakout Room) upstairs will be open
- The Relaxed Room will be available at least 15 minutes before the show starts
   and 15 minutes after the show ends
- There will be a screen on balcony level, showing the performance, if you need
   it

#### If I come along to the Relaxed Performance, What Does this mean?

A Relaxed performance is designed to make the theatre an accessible leisure opportunity for those with a variety of needs, along with their family and friends. A Relaxed performance is a type of accessible performance, adapted to the needs and taking into account the sensory needs of individuals visiting the theatre. The aims are to reduce anxiety and stress otherwise caused by the average theatre going experience, to introduce an individual to the theatre for the first time, or to allow an individual the opportunity to come to the theatre with a more relaxed atmosphere.

Our Access events have specific measures and additions, which are not available during regular shows and performances.

#### These measures for Relaxed Performances include:

- Relaxed Room on Balcony Level (the Breakout Room)
- Additional Screen showing the performance outside the auditorium (Balcony level)
  - Auditorium lighting is kept at a higher level
    - Auditorium speaker sound reduced
  - Reduction and non-existence of unnecessary noises throughout Front of House
- Limited to two loudspeaker announcements (before the show begins at Act One and Act Two)
- Wheelchair spaces to accommodate a range of different wheelchair types and sizes
